

Ponce, Saturday Feb 18, 1928.

My dear Bishop:

Just a line or two before I leave for San Juan. In thinking over our various conversations of yesterday the first thing that comes to my mind is the necessity of feeding the cows with new calves until the rains come and there is more grass, and even after the grass is renewed, I think it well to avoid as you said the sickness that comes with the new grass. Also the yield of milk is much greater when the cows are fed and the difference in milk should pay for the feed. The alimeto also for the calves would greatly help.

Then the repairs to the house should be begun. Perhaps it would be well to get an estimate of how much each part of the job will cost.

Ditching the coffee as suggested by you should be done now I think, as the rains seem to be coming nearer & nearer each day. I will see that Miss Leary sends you the money for the farm as allowed by the Department i.e. \$33.33 per mo. for Jan + Feb. and same to continue until the salary is needed for the agriculturalist.

Am much interested in your proposition for the boys you will of course be at the meeting of the Council when it will be discussed. Please arrange for the bridge as outlined before to me and tell the Sub. it is to be

that you have my authority to authorize the position  
of the bridge.
